The [Eastern Woodlands Office](#) (EWONAP) serves 66 Tribes within 16 states and 6 HUD regions. EWONAP administers over \$90 million in IHBG funds, over \$60 million in Section 184 Native American Home Mortgages, and approximately \$6 million in ICDBG funds in its region annually.

[NAHASDA Reauthorization Stalled in the House](#): In March 2014 Steve Pearce (R-New Mexico) introduced a draft reauthorization bill which was followed days later by the introduction of a second NAHASDA reauthorization bill by Rep. Don Young (R-Alaska), chairman of the [Subcommittee on Indian and Alaska Native Affairs](#). Both drafts were introduced to the [House Financial Services Committee](#) for further consideration but no resolution has been reported or [scheduled for hearing](#) to date.

Section 184 Native American Home Mortgage Program Lifts Moratorium on Refinancing: The loan guarantee fee on Section 184 loans increased by half a percent to 1.5%. **The moratorium on refinancing has been lifted.** ONAP's Office of Loan Guarantee is accepting applications to refinance existing mortgages on fee simple and Tribal trust lands.

[HHS Assets for Independence Demonstration Program](#): The Office of Community Services (OCS) within the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) announces that competing applications will be accepted for grants to administer projects for the national Assets for Independence (AFI) of Individual Development Accounts (IDAs). The projects will provide IDAs and related services to individuals and families with low incomes. A primary feature of each AFI project is that participants save earned income in an IDA to purchase a home, capitalize or expand a business for self-employment, or attend postsecondary education or training. Projects also ensure that participants have access to financial education training and coaching, including family budgeting, debt and credit counseling, using mainstream financial products, and accessing refundable tax credits. As a condition of their federal AFI grant, grantees must provide non-federal funds to support their AFI project in an amount at least equal to the Federal AFI grant amount. 2014. This is a standing announcement. For the next three Fiscal Years (2014, 2015, 2016), there will be multiple application due dates during each year. [Department of Transportation FY 2014 TIGER Grants](#): Tribal governments are eligible for funding from the Dept. of Transportation's National Infrastructure Investments. Provides opportunity for all Americans by investing in transportation projects that better connect communities to centers of employment, education, and services (including for non-drivers) and that hold promise to stimulate long-term job growth, especially in economically distressed areas. Additional consideration will be given to proposals that seek to strengthen opportunities to expand the middle class. TIGER FY 2014 is authorized to award up to \$35 million (of the program's \$600 million total) for planning grants. [Indian Education Formula Grants](#): This Department of Education program is designed to address the unique education and culturally related academic needs of American Indian and Alaska Native students, including preschool children, so that these students

[Byrne Criminal Justice Innovation Program \(DOJ\)](#): Indian tribal governments are eligible. The U.S. Dept of Justice offers up to \$750,000 in grants over a period of up to 3 years to plan and implement place- based, community-oriented strategies to address targeted crime issues within a neighborhood as a part of a broader neighborhood revitalization initiative. The program will lead efforts to enhance the capacity of local and tribal communities to effectively target and address significant crime issues through collaborative cross-sector approaches that help advance broader neighborhood development goals. [Smart Growth Information Clearinghouse \(EPA\)](#): Indian Tribes are eligible to apply. Function as a "one stop shop "for the best information currently available on effective smart growth approaches to help communities make development choices to deliver environmental, economic, and quality of life benefits. The clearinghouse will also serve as the virtual home of the Smart Growth Network (SGN), a nationally recognized coalition of leadership organizations that have formally endorsed the principles of smart growth. [Violent Gang & Gun Crime Reduction Program \(Project Safe Neighborhoods\)](#): This U.S. Dept of Justice program is designed to create safer neighborhoods through a sustained reduction in crime associated with gang and gun violence. The program's effectiveness is based on the cooperation of local, state, and federal agencies engaged in a unified approach led by the U.S. Attorney in each district. Project Safe Neighborhoods Task Force fiscal agents for the U.S. Attorney districts and federally recognized Indian tribal governments. Eligible fiscal agents incl. states, units of local government, educational institutions, faith-based & other community organizations, private nonprofit organizations, and Indian tribal governments. [Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program](#): Federally recognized Native American Tribal Governments are eligible to apply for this U.S. Dept of Homeland Security program that supports the building, sustainment and delivery of core capabilities to enable Tribes to strengthen their capacity to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from potential terrorist attacks and other hazards. Hazardous Waste Management Grant Program for Tribes: This notice announces the availability of funds and solicits proposals from federally-recognized tribes or intertribal consortia for the development and implementation of hazardous waste programs and for building capacity to address hazardous waste management in Indian country. In accordance with the EPA Indian Policy of 1984, EPA recognizes tribal governments as the primary parties for managing programs for reservations. FEMA FY 2014 Pre-Disaster Mitigation and Flood Mitigation Assistance: Federally-recognized tribal governments are eligible to apply. Applicants are encouraged to review the [Hazard Mitigation Assistance Unified Guidance](#) for detailed information regarding eligibility and to contact their FEMA Regional Office for additional information. Emergency Community Water Assistance Grants (USDA-RD): Program helps eligible rural communities recover from or prepare for emergencies that result in a decline in capacity to provide safe, reliable drinking water for households and businesses. Federally recognized Tribal lands and colonias are also eligible. Privately owned wells are not eligible. Up to \$150,000 for repairs to breaks or leaks in existing water distribution lines, & related maintenance is available and up to \$500,000 for construction of a new water source, intake and/or treatment facility or waterline extensions. Indian Loan Guaranty, Insurance, and Interest Subsidy Program (DOI): This program assists in obtaining financing from private sources to promote business development initiatives that contribute to the economy of the reservation or service area. Qualifications for this program: An individually enrolled member of a Federally recognized American Indian tribe or Alaska Native group, a corporation with no less than 51% ownership by Federally recognized American Indians or Alaska Natives, or a Federally recognized American Indian Tribe or Alaska Native group. EDA's Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance Programs Grants: The Economic Development Administration (EDA) supports development in economically distressed areas of the United States by fostering job creation and attracting private investment. Specifically, under the Economic Development Assistance programs (EDAP) Federal Funding Opportunity (FFO) announcement, EDA will make construction, non-construction, and revolving loan fund investments under the Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance Programs. Grants made under these programs will leverage regional assets to support the implementation of regional economic development strategies designed to create jobs, leverage private capital, encourage economic development, and strengthen America's ability to compete in the global marketplace. **Deadline: Multiple funding cycles, [see announcement](#).**

[FM Global Fire Prevention Grant Program](#): The FM Global Fire Prevention Grant Program supports a wide array of fire prevention, preparedness, and control efforts throughout the U.S. and internationally. Funded projects include pre-fire planning for commercial, industrial, and institutional facilities; fire and arson prevention and investigation; and fire prevention education and training programs. Fire departments and brigades, as well as national, state, regional, local, and community organizations are eligible to apply. **Deadline: OPEN**

[Indian Health Service Offers Loan Repayment Program](#): The Indian Health Service Loan Repayment Program provides repayment of student loans to health and allied health professions in order to assure an adequate supply of trained health professionals necessary to maintain accreditation of, and provide health care services to, Indians through Indian health programs. There is a service obligation and payback requirement for participants of the LRP. To qualify for this benefit program, you must have student loan debt. You must also be qualified/certified/licensed in dentistry, family medicine, internal medicine, geriatric medicine, psychiatry, as a nurse or nurse anesthetist, or you must be a current or prospective student accepted or enrolled in an accredited degree program, college or university. [HUD ONAP Title VI Loan Guarantee Program](#): The Title VI loan guarantee assists [Indian Housing Block Grant \(IHBG\)](#) recipients to leverage up to 5 times their IHBG ‘Need’ funding to finance affordable housing development by pledging future IHBG grant funds as security for repayment of the loan. A private lender provides the financing and HUD provides the guarantee to the lender. [Section 184 Indian Housing Loan Guarantee Program](#): Tribes can use Section 184 loans to achieve their housing development goals. Some benefits include:

- Low residential mortgage interest rates
- Refinancing now available on fee simple and trust lands
- Low down payment
- May utilize up to 15% of loan funds for site infrastructure costs
- One time loan guarantee fee (1.5%) and no PMI
- No household income restrictions
